

#2 - Signing of Common Core bypassed parents.

Good evening, Superintendent _____ and board members:

My name is _____. I come before you tonight to give you my concerns and reasons about Common Core State Standards Initiative, the new federal education program that Governor Schwarzenegger signed in 2010, - sight unseen, and what we are now supposed to be implementing in all of our districts across the State.

Most people have not yet heard of COMMON CORE; that was by design. You were not supposed to know about it. Congress did not know about it either. Both Congress and all of the State legislators

in the 46 States that signed onto it were bypassed in the decision making.

Why? Because that way President Obama, the Federal Department of Education and the national/international cartel that helped create and write Common Core could slip it into the States more easily without a lot of controversy and haggling. They did not want it debated. It probably could not have passed a very close inspection anyway. So that is exactly what happened.

Our president went to the Governors directly while their legislatures were not in session, so discussion, nor a vote by the legislators was allowed.

Actually, it was more like the States were “coerced” by tempting them with enormous stimulus grant money, a waiver to get out of “No Child Left Behind’s” rigid requirements and threatening to take away Title One funds if they did not sign on.

Cleverly, the administration pressed the States to sign, giving them just a small window of time even before the actual standards, curricula, and assessment tests were able to be seen.

So essentially, we now have “education without representation” and “taxation without representation,” because the citizens whose taxpaying dollars are supposed to pay for Common Core were not informed or represented in the decision making process.
